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# No Stopping Bucs on Way to No. 9

ight wasn't enough for the Flint Beecher boys basketball team. The Bucs won the program's ninth MHSAA Finals championship in 2021 with an impressive 75-47 victory over Iron Mountain in the Division 3 Final at the Breslin Center.

Beecher moved into a tie for second with Detroit Country Day and Muskegon Christian/Western Michigan Christian for all-time boys basketball championships won. River Rouge tops all schools with 14.

"We just wanted to come out and establish our defense," Bucs coach Mike Williams said. "They prepared and fought, and they executed. I couldn't be more proud."

Beecher had last won a Finals title in 2017. The Bucs' only loss this winter was to Division 1 contender Orchard Lake St. Mary's in the second game of the season.

This was an emotional title run for Williams, whose father passed away nearly a year ago to the championship game date from COVID-19.

Senior Keyon Menifield Jr. lost his grandfather the day after due to COVID-19 complications.

"It's extremely special and these kids have been my therapy," Williams said. "This has been a long year for me and my family, and we had some other kids deal with it as well. This is a part of the healing for me and the community and the people that have gone through this pandemic. I'm just glad we got to the finish line."

Menifield Jr. scored a game-high 37 points – the ninth-most in an MHSAA Final. He was 17 of 27 from the field with only one 3-pointer and two free throws contributing to his total.

"We locked down our defense and we knew we had to get stops, close out and get rebounds," Menifield Jr. said. "I had to attack, and I had to make sure I got in the lane and made shots. The team that makes the most shots wins the battle."

Williams, whose team won its last 15 games with only two opponents coming within single digits, said Menifield Jr. hasn't received the attention he deserves.

"I've been saying all along that he is either the most underrated player or the best player in the state of Michigan, period," he said. "I don't know anyone who wants to guard him, and I've talked to college coaches who have not recruited him and told them they were crazy."

The Bucs also were able to contain Iron Mountain senior standout Foster Wonders, who scored more than 2,000 career points.

He was held to 13 points and didn't score until the third quarter.

"The best compliment I can give a player is I would pay money to watch him play," Williams said. "That kid can play, and we knew that we had to neutralize him one way or the other for us to have a chance to win."

The Bucs held a commanding 38-19 at halftime. They led by as many as 34 in the second half en route to the decisive victory.

The Mountaineers simply couldn't match Flint Beecher's size, speed and athleticism. The Bucs' full-court pressure forced 20 turnovers

"All the credit goes to Flint Beecher," Iron Mountain coach Harvey Johnson said. "They were tough, and they did to us what no other team could do completely. They're quick, they're fast and their press and ability to create off the dribble bothered us. He had his team well-prepared."

Iron Mountain finished as Division 3 runner-up for the second time in three seasons, and Saturday's loss was only the Mountaineers' second over the last two seasons. They were 21-1 last year before the pandemic halted the postseason.

"These eight guys were outstanding, and we beat some great teams to get here," Johnson said. "I think they represented themselves, our school, our community, and the entire Upper Peninsula with great class. They worked hard and overcame a ton of adversity like every other athlete in the state did to get here. Not many kids get to play here, and we were blessed to be able to do that."

Jurgen Kleiman added 12 points and eight rebounds for Iron Mountain, while Dante Basanese chipped in 11 points.

#### **DIVISION 1**

#### Grand Blanc 45, Ann Arbor Huron 36

The Grand Blanc boys basketball team spends 45 minutes each practice focusing on defense. In the end, it was extra time well spent.

A strong defensive effort helped propel the Bobcats to a 45-36 win over Ann Arbor Huron in the 2021 Division 1 Final at the Breslin Center.

It was the first Finals championship in school history for Grand Blanc, which ended the River Rats' bid for a perfect season and their first championship.

"They hate it, but that's what happens when you spend that much time on defense," said Grand Blanc coach Mike Thomas, who guided Kalamazoo Central to Class A crowns in 2010 and 2011.

The Bobcats (15-2), who were Class B runners-up in 1952 the only other time they played in a title game, averaged nearly 80 points per game, but struggled to knock down shots in the Final.


Despite their shooting woes, Grand Blanc's defense shined and allowed only 12 second-half points in holding Huron to its lowest scoring output of the season.

Sophomore RJ Taylor was the catalyst on offense in the first half and finished with 15 points, while Timonte Boyd came off the bench to add 12 points and seven rebounds.

Junior Ty Rodgers played 31 minutes and contributed nine points, seven rebounds, three assists and three steals.

The River Rats' struggles included making only 3 of 21 3-point attempts and missing 10 free throws. They also committed 14 turnovers.

#### DIVISION 2

### Grand Rapids CC 77, BC Pennfield 54

The Grand Rapids Catholic Central boys basketball team was heartbroken when it lost in overtime by a point to Benton Harbor in the 2018 Class B Final.

A second-half push guaranteed there wouldn't be any stressful final moments last April at Breslin Center.

The Cougars secured the program's first MHSAA championship with a 77-54 win over Battle Creek Pennfield in the Division 2 finale.

Catholic Central finished 20-0 and erased the disappointing memories of three years earlier.

"A lot of guys from that (2018) team sent us a lot of messages over the last couple days about finishing what they started," Cougars coach T.J. Meerman said. "So that was our mission tonight."

"This is amazing," said junior Jack Karasinski, who scored 18 points as one of four Cougars scoring in double figures.


Sophomore Kaden Brown sparked the Cougars and finished with a gamehigh 25 points. Freshman Durral Brooks had 10 points and 11 rebounds, while junior Jorden Brooks chipped in 10 points and seven rebounds.

An entertaining first half included seven lead changes and seven ties.

The score was 13-13 at the end of the first guarter, and 31-31 at the half.

Over a span of four minutes early in the third quarter, the Cougars went on a 14-2 run and snared a 48-36 lead they never relinquished.

### **DIVISION 4**

#### Detroit Douglass 47, Wyoming Tri-unity 41

Detroit Douglass senior guard Pierre Brooks II sought out his coach, also his father, as the final seconds ticked away.

The pair shared an emotional embrace as they celebrated the program's first MHSAA title with a 47-41 win over Wyoming Tri-unity Christian in the Division 4 Final.

"This is the best feeling in the world, and especially winning a state championship with your dad," Brooks II said. "It's been a long road since my freshman year, and we used to butt heads a lot. Towards the end of my high school career we really started to click a lot more, especially with the pandemic."

Brooks II recorded a double-double with 15 points and 11 rebounds to help lift the Hurricanes to the victory in their first Finals appearance.

He also added five assists, two steals and two blocked shots.

"I've never said this to him personally, but Pierre is the best player I've ever coached," Douglass coach Pierre Brooks Sr. said. "I've been coaching for 22 years, and the work that he puts in on his own and the dedication he has to get better is amazing. This moment is really special for me."

Douglass' 6-foot-10 senior center, Javantae Randle, also played a pivotal role and produced a double-double with 15 points and 10 rebounds.

Tri-unity was playing in its ninth Final, but came up short as runner-up for the fifth time.

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### Title IX Turns 50, and Results Speak Volumes

the recent Olympics in Tokyo would be an understatement. Among the 66 medals earned by American female Olympians – most by any country in the history of the Games – were gold-medal performances by the U.S. basketball, volleyball, water polo and beach volleyball teams. Eighteen medals were earned by the U.S. women swimmers, female track and field athletes claimed 15 medals, and the U.S. women's softball and soccer teams won silver and bronze medals, respectively.

In the past 30 years of the Olympic Games, the United States has dominated the women's team sports of basketball (nine golds), soccer (four golds, one silver, one bronze) and softball (three golds, two silvers) — not to mention the untold number of medals in track and field. And this past summer, the U.S. women's volleyball team claimed its first gold medal.

These performances by some of our nation's most skilled female athletes never would have been possible without the passage of Title IX and the offerings of these sports through our nation's schools. With the chance to play afforded by the landmark Title IX legislation in 1972, girls participation in several high school sports skyrocketed in the years that followed.

When the NFHS conducted its first participation survey in 1971, basketball and outdoor track and field were the primary girls sports, comprising about two-thirds of the 294,000 total. However, with the opportunity to play additional sports, girls flocked to volleyball and softball first, along with cross country and eventually soccer.

Soccer, in fact, has had the most remarkable growth. In 1971, only 700 girls were playing high school soccer. Twenty-five years later, that number had climbed to almost 210,000; and as the 50th anniversary of Title IX approaches, there are now almost 400,000 girls playing high school soccer – a staggering 56,200 percentage increase in 50 years. Soccer now ranks fourth in popularity among girls high school sports – all because of that opportunity in 1972.

There are many other success stories, however. The pre-Title IX survey in 1971 indicated that 1,719 girls were participating in cross country. With increases every year until 2015, today, there are 219,345 girls competing in high school programs and the sport ranks sixth in popularity.

Although participation numbers have leveled a bit the past 10 years, fast-pitch softball is another sport that flour-ished after the passage of Title IX. With fewer than 10,000 participants in 1971, the numbers quickly rose to 220,000 by 1985 and 343,000 by 2000, and softball is currently fifth among girls sports with 362,038 participants.

Since track and field and basketball were the primary sports in the early days of girls sports programs, increases in those sports have not been as dramatic; however, they remain the first and third most-popular sports, respectively,

today. Volleyball, however, much like soccer, continues its upward climb.

Without a doubt, volleyball has seen the steadiest increases among girls high school sports the past 50 years. After starting with 17,952 participants in 1971, the numbers jumped to 300,810 by 1990 and 409,332 by 2010 and 452,808 by 2018. During its climb, volleyball surpassed basketball as the No. 2 girls sport.

And among the top six girls sports from 2010 to 2018 (numbers are not available the past two years due to the pandemic), volleyball has gained the most participants (43,476), followed by soccer (32,549). And all of this has occurred thanks to legislation passed in 1972 that was not fundamentally meant to address opportunities for girls to participate in high school sports.

The NFHS is leading a yearlong celebration of the 50th anniversary of Title IX, which officially occurs on June 23, 2022. "Title IX at 50 – Celebrating and Growing Opportunities" is highlighting the law's impact by celebrating the inspirational individuals and landmark moments in the history of Title IX, and continuing to grow the educational and competitive opportunities for the future.

The MHSAA is joining in the celebration with regular installments on its feature website, MHSAA SecondHalf. Join us in recognizing the key people who helped build and promote opportunities for female student-athletes in Michigan.

Dr. Karissa L. Niehoff is in her fourth year as executive director of the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) in Indianapolis. She is the first female to head the national leadership organization for high school athletics and performing arts activities and the sixth full-time executive director of the NFHS. She previously was executive director of the Connecticut Association of Schools-Connecticut Interscholastic Athletic Conference.

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### **Scholar-Athlete Class of 2022**

he Michigan High School Athletic Association/Farm Bureau Insurance Scholar-Athlete Award has been recognizing the top student-athletes for 33 years. Applicants for the Scholar-Athlete Award must meet the following criteria: A minimum cumulative grade-point average of 3.5 on a 4.0 scale; and must have previously won a varsity letter. Applicants also show involvement in other school and community activities; submit two letters of recommendation and a 500-word essay on the importance of sportsmanship in educational athletics.

Recipients of the 2021-22 Scholar-Athlete Award receive a \$2,000 college scholarship to be used at the college, university, or trade school of their choice during the 2022-23 school year. This year, a total of 1,434 applications from 407 schools were received for the 32 scholarships. Class A students were guaranteed 12 winners, Class B eight winners, Class C six winners and Class D four winners. Two at-large winners were also selected.

All scholarship recipients will be honored during the MHSAA Boys Baksetball Finals at the Breslin Center in East Lansing this March.

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### **Student Advisory Council Aids MHSAA**

ight student-athletes who are juniors at their schools during the 2021-22 academic year have been selected to serve two-year terms on the Michigan High School Athletic Association's Student Advisory Council.

The Student Advisory Council is a 16-member group which provides feedback on issues impacting educational athletics from a student's perspective, and also is involved in the operation of Association championship events and other programming. Members of the Student Advisory Council serve for two years, beginning as juniors. Eight new members are selected annually to serve on the SAC, with nominations made by MHSAA member schools. The incoming juniors will join the group of eight seniors-to-be appointed a year ago.

Selected to begin serving on the Student Advisory Council in 2021-22 are: Sam Gibson, Plainwell; Brady Leistra, East Grand Rapids; Caroline Li, Okemos; Sam Matias, Lansing Catholic; Zar'ria Mitchell, Saginaw Heritage; Carney Salo, Escanaba; Brandon Thompson, Petersburg Summerfield; and Keira Tolmie, Clarkston.

Those eight new members were selected from 114 applicants. That applicant total was 40 percent more than the total number of applicants who generally apply for SAC positions every year.

Applications for the next SAC class can be found on MHSAA.com are now being accepted through April 25.

The first Student Advisory Council was formed for the 2006-07 school year. With the addition of this class beginning this summer, members will have represented 122 schools from 46 leagues plus independent schools that do not play in a league. Combined, the new appointees have participated in 12 MHSAA sports, and five will be the first SAC members from their respective schools.

The Student Advisory Council generally meets seven times each school year, and once more for a 24-hour leadership camp. Last school year, due to COVID-19, the Council met nearly twice as many times, but virtually all but once when members met for an outdoor, socially-distanced session.

In addition to assisting in the promotion of the educational value of interscholastic

# The MHSAA Representative Council

he Representative Council of the Michigan High School Athletic Association is the body assembled to carry out the wishes of member schools. The Council meets several times annually to discuss and pass legislation concerning interscholastic athletics in Michigan.

The Representative Council is made up of 19 members, with all but five elected by a vote of MHSAA-member schools to represent different geographic regions, different sizes of schools, nonpublic schools, and junior and middle schools. Two members are elected to statewide at-large positions. Four members are appointed by the Council to facilitate representation of females and minorities, and the 19th position is occupied by the Superintendent of Public Instruction or his/her designee.

The officers and two other representatives form the MHSAA's Executive Committee, which meets on a monthly basis during the school year to review eligibility appeals and other current business.

# **Bruce Horsch Earns 2021 Forsythe Award**

nce or twice a year, Bruce Horsch gets the question - mostly during a Winter Olympics year or after someone has watched "Miracle on Ice" and found out the "Horsch" that is mentioned twice is actually the recentlyretired Houghton High School athletic director.

The final goaltender cut from the 1980 U.S. hockey team that went on to stun the world in winning Olympic gold, Horsch went on to coach at multiple college programs before becoming Houghton's athletic director in 1996 at the age of 40.

These days, many also know him for the commitment, mentorship and leadership shown in that position through his retirement in 2019.

To celebrate his many contributions to interscholastic athletics, Horsch has been named the 2022 honoree for the MHSAA's Charles E. Forsythe Award.

The annual award is in its 45th year and named after former MHŠAA Executive Director Charles E. Forsythe, the Association's first full-time and chief longest-serving executive. Forsythe Award recipients are selected year by the MHSAA Representative Council, based on an individual's outstanding contributions to the interscholastic athletics community.

Horsch was described as a "not in the spotlight guy" by one of those who

recommended him for the Forsythe Award, but he certainly spent time there. Horsch was a college hockey star and NHL draft pick, and had begun his minor league hockey career before playing with the U.S. team right up until the final cuts on the way to Lake Placid, N.Y.

After his playing days concluded, he coached collegiately before eventually settling in as Houghton's athletic director for the 1996-97 school year.

"I was fortunate enough to play at Michigan Tech, and I was on a national championship team (in 1975) and I was on a national runner-up team (in 1976). When you played for (coach) John MacInnes up here, it wasn't individuals – we won because we were a team" Horsch said.

"I'm not out for recognition. I enjoy being part of a team. I enjoy working with other people, and that's my satisfaction."

He led many important ones in his roles as a school sports administrator. Horsch was named his region's Athletic Director of the Year in both 2003 and 2019 by the Michigan Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (MIAAA), and served on the Upper Peninsula Athletic Committee from 2001-05. He has been an active member of the MIAAA, National Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (NIAAA) and Upper Peninsula Athletic Directors Association (UPADA), serving as secretary and president of the UPADA.

He also served as president of the Keweenaw Area Athletic Directors Association and secretary and commissioner of the Western Peninsula Athletic Conference.

"For years Bruce was one of the most respected voices not only in the Upper Peninsula but also the entire state," MHSAA Executive Director Mark Uyl said. "He brought that perspective as a high-end athlete and transitioned extremely well as an educator and athletic director."

Horsch was a frequent host of MHSAA Tournaments at the District and Regional rounds during his time at Houghton, and also hosted MHSAA Upper Peninsula Finals. He served as a host for sessions of the MHSAA PACE program, the coaching education program predecessor to the current Coaches Advancement Program (CAP).

His dedication to Houghton athletics was further noted when

he considered retiring in 2017 but stayed on two more years to assist with a bond that resulted in in the upgrading of the school's football field and track and building of softball and baseball fields as part of the athletic complex. Previously, he had led a referendum to have a second gymnasium built to provide an additional practice venue with girls basketball moving from the fall to winter season beginning with the 2007-08

"I'm proud of the fact that in the U.P. there are not many, if any schools that have the facilities that Houghton High School has," Horsch said.

Horsch is a graduate of Hastings High School in Minnesota and earned a bachelor's degree in business administration from Michigan Technological University. He led the Huskies hockey team to 58 victories in goal over four seasons and was part of the 1975 NCAA championship team, two of many reasons he was inducted into the Michigan Tech Sports Hall of Fame in 2007. He was drafted by the Montreal Canadiens during the ninth round of the 1976 NHL draft and played minor league hockey for two seasons. He then coached hockey collegiately for most of the 1980s as an assistant at Ferris State and then Michigan Tech.


