Rockford Reigns in D1

Rockford ran its Division 1 girls lacrosse championship streak to seven straight titles in 2019. The Rams got past Brighton 21-6, following up a similarly dominant 25-5 win over the Bulldogs in the 2018 Final.

Rockford finished 15-5-1, with four of the losses and the tie coming against teams from Illinois and Ohio.



"It's a ton of fun, and we have great leadership from our seniors," said Rams coach Mike Emery. "We have great youth coming up through the program, and we've really built a culture over the last 10 years."

The reigning champs wasted no time scoring as Isabelle Holmes found the net 50 seconds into the game to give the Rams a 1-0 lead.

Exactly 60 seconds later, Holmes added her second to get Rockford off to a good start.

Brighton's first offensive attack led to a score by Sophie Mondro, but seconds later the Rams scored again on a goal by Katie Rodriguez to make it 3-1. Rodriguez tacked on another at 20:49 to give Rockford a 4-1 advantage.

With Rockford a player short, Cat Kophcia scored to make it 4-2. But Sydney Zimmerman emerged from the penalty box and scored to make it 5-2 after running down an errant pass.

Holmes scored her third goal of the half to increase Rockford's lead to 6-2 at the 12:34 mark. Chloe Dunham then took a feed from Mackenzie Delacher and found the net to give Rockford a 7-2 lead, and Rodriguez picked up a loose ball and scored her third of the game.

Mondro scored her second and third goals of the game for Brighton to trim the deficit to five.

Brighton (16-8-1) mounted a rally as Kophcia scored her second to make it 8-4. But with Brighton a player short, Dunham scored her second goal to extend the lead to 9-4. Zimmerman scored her second as the eventual champs moved ahead 10-4.

Mondro then scored her fourth goal for Brighton, but senior standout Karrington Vander Molen finally got on the board for Rockford as the advantage swelled to 11-5. She finished with three goals. Dunham scored with 10 seconds left in the half to give the Rams a 12-5 lead.

Rodriguez opened the second half with a goal, her fourth, to make it 13-5.

"It's so fun," said Rodriguez. "The team aspect of it never gets old. We have so much energy. It's so fun to win it still."

Division 2 - East Grand Rapids 22, Bloomfield Hills Marian 7

Less than a minute into the 2019 Division 2 Final, East Grand Rapids began to assert its dominance against Bloomfield Hills Marian.

And playing a flawless, turnover-free first half, the Pioneers piled up 18 goals on the way to a resounding 22-7 victory to clinch their sixth championship in eight years.

The Pioneers (24-2) had won five straight titles before losing to Bloomfield Hills Cranbrook Kingswood in the 2017 championship game and not making the Finals in 2018.

EGR's high-powered offense scored at least 20 goals in each of its six tournament games.

"We had five really strong seniors, and we had five freshmen come in," said coach Rich Axtell. "It's a real mixture of age and youth. Last year, we had pretty much the same lineup, but some freshmen have come up and really made a difference."

Seniors Mary Schumar (six goals) and **Audrey Whiteside** (below, five goals) led the first-half onslaught as EGR built a 14-goal lead. Both finished with seven goals and were taken out of the game with more than five minutes to play.



"We wanted it so much for the seniors," said Whiteside. "I was a freshman when we won it (2016). Mary and I have worked well together. They put me on attack so I could work with Mary so we could get more points. We work together on the draw, and it just came together so well."

Said Axtell: "Audrey and Mary are once-in-a-decade type of players. Between the two of them, they have 350 points this season. They had an amazing year."

The Pioneers wasted little time scoring, as Whiteside found the net the first time 50 seconds into the game for a 1-0 lead. Thirteen seconds later, Schumar scored to make it 2-0. Whiteside quickly scored her second goal and the Pioneers were rolling, up three goals with Marian failing to put together an offensive rush. Schumar followed suit, scoring 38 seconds later to put the Mustangs in a 4-0 deficit.







Scholar-Athlete Class of 2021

he Michigan High School Athletic Association/Farm Bureau Insurance Scholar-Athlete Award has been recognizing the top student-athletes for 32 years. Applicants for the Scholar-Athlete Award must meet the following criteria: A minimum cumulative grade-point average of 3.5 on a 4.0 scale; and must have previously won a varsity letter. Applicants also show involvement in other school and community activities; submit two letters of recommendation and a 500-word essay on the importance of sportsmanship in educational athletics.

Recipients of the 2020-21 Scholar-Athlete Award receive a \$1,000 college scholarship to be used at the college, university, or trade school of their choice during the 2021-22 school year. This year, a total of 1,356 applications from 418 schools were received for the 32 scholarships. Class A students were guaranteed 12 winners, Class B eight winners, Class C six winners and Class D four winners. Two at-large winners were also selected.

All scholarship recipients will be honored in a virtual ceremony later this spring. Details and a video of the ceremony will be posted on MHSAA.com.

Student Advisory Council Aids MHSAA

he Student Advisory Council is a 16-member group which provides feedback on issues impacting educational athletics from a student's perspective, and also is involved in the operation of Association championship events and other programming. Members of the Student Advisory Council serve for two years, beginning as juniors. Eight new members are selected annually to serve on the SAC, with nominations made by MHSAA member schools. The incoming juniors join the group of eight seniors-to-be appointed a year earlier.

Those eight new members were selected from a record-high 179 applicants, twice as many as generally apply for SAC positions every year.

The first Student Advisory Council was formed for the 2006-07 school year. With the addition of this class beginning this summer, members will have represented 117 schools from 45 leagues plus independent schools that do not play in a league. Combined, the new appointees have participated in nine MHSAA sports, and seven will be the first SAC members from their respective schools.

The Representative Council is made up of 19 members, with all but five elected by a vote of MHSAA-member schools to represent different geographic regions, different sizes of schools, nonpublic schools, and junior and middle schools. Two members are elected to statewide at-large positions. Four members are appointed by the Council to facilitate representation of females and minorities, and the 19th position is occupied by the Superintendent of Public Instruction or his/her designee.

The officers and two other representatives form the MHSAA's Executive Committee, which meets on a monthly basis during the school year to review eligibility appeals and other current business.
