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

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





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8-TIME CHAMPION, 4-TIME CHAMPION HIGHLIGHT '20





rent Metcalf. Austin Boone. That's it. That's the list. Boone, a senior at Lowell, became the second wrestler in MHSAA history to win four individual titles while being part of four team titles, as he defeated Gaylord's Chase LaJoie 4-3 at 145 pounds during the Division 2 Individual Finals at Ford Field in 2020.

Metcalf, who eventually became an NCAA champion and competed on the international stage, was the first to accomplish the feat, achieving his at Davison from 2002-05.

"It's cool," Boone said. "Like I've been telling everybody else, I'm not really thinking about it too much. It's kind of cool, but I don't pay attention to stuff like that."

He and Mendon's Skyler Crespo became the 27th and 28th four-time individual champions in MHSAA history, nearly simultaneously.

Boone (41-0), who had defeated LaJoie by major decision a week earlier in the Team Finals, had to stave off a late reversal attempt Saturday.

It was a matchup of multiple-time champions, as LaJoie (38-2) had won as a freshman and sophomore. It was also a matchup of Division I talents, as Boone has signed with Penn State, and LaJoie will continue his career at Cornell.

"It's a great match; it's my closest finals match I've had," Boone said. "He's a great wrestler. He's going to do great things in college. Today I got him."

kyler Crespo reached Michigan wrestling immortality in 2020. The senior from Mendon became just the 28th wrestler in MHSAA history — and second on the day — to earn a fourth Individual Finals title.

Crespo posted an 11-0 major decision victory over Clinton sophomore Kent McCombs in the Division 4 145-pound championship match at Ford Field.

Crespo finished with a 53-1 record as a senior and more than 200 career wins. His only defeat this season came against an out-of-state opponent.

"This feels better than you can imagine," smiled Crespo.

"One day in seventh grade my coach texted me and asked me, 'What are your goals?' I told him I wanted to go D-I," added Crespo. "He said 'that we have to have some other goals, too. He said why not go for it all?' That's what I did each year."

McCombs finished his sophomore campaign with a 37-10 record and was part of Clinton's team championship run. He also lost in the 2019 quarterfinals to Crespo, and wound up finishing fifth.

"I knew he was good on top, but I knew I could take him. I knew I was better. I don't want to sound cocky, but I have confidence in myself and my training," added Crespo. "There was no way I was going to lose today."







Getting to the Finish Line Surely and Safely

It has now been more than a year since the Covid-19 global pandemic changed everyday life and brought an abrupt end to the MHSAA Winter tournaments of 2020, on March 12 of 2020 to be exact.

Thousands of students could not see through to the end all of their efforts in basketball, gymnastics, ice hockey and LP boys swimming and diving.

Little did we know then that thousands more would not have the opportunity to participate in *any* Spring sports. For seniors around Michigan and the country, that also resulted in no proms, graduations, or even stepping onto the college campus of their choice when fall rolled around.

It was against those seemingly insurmountable odds that the MHSAA – buoyed by its hard-working and dedicated membership – rolled up its sleeves and went to work to provided athletic opportunities in 2020-21 that were taken away from so many last school year.

Since last July, the goal of the MHSAA has been to have three seasons in this school year that all reached the finish line. It was at times a rollercoaster ride to rival any amusement park but thanks to the leadership of our schools and willingness of participants to conform to new and everchanging state guidelines, we made it to the end of the frenetic fall journey.

When the annual 2020 championships in LP girls swimming, volleyball and football concluded – in January of 2021, it was a sense of accomplishment.

However, a cloud of uncertainty still lingered over this Winter's games as the waiting game continued to realize enough decline in Covid numbers that would allow our students to return to buildings and athletic arenas. As with the summer leading up to this school year, and as our winter start dates were postponed time and again, the reality was that kids were going to be playing sports someplace. Period.

Since last May, that belief was proven consistently as athletic activity took place in the club, travel, AAU and non-school space nearly every day. The trend continued the longer school sports were put on hold at the start of 2021, putting our school seasons in greater jeopardy by forcing individuals and families to seek activity out-of-state. It was not only a violation of MDHHS orders, but sending all of those families into different states only served as an impediment to getting students back in school fulltime.

It was always our stance that we could contribute to students returning to in-person learning by allowing MHSAA member schools to begin full activities, participating locally and against more local competition, and under the guidance of trained, professional educators.

The last part – under the guidance of professional educators– is the most important during these times, and thanks to our schools, we proved that notion true.

When four sports saw their seasons interrupted in late November, the MHSAA membership was determined not to let those students suffer the same fate as those did a year ago. Thus, we were allowed to complete fall sports because those teams took part in the MDHHS rapid testing pilot program. Results of that program were overwhelmingly positive. A total of 5,376 individuals (athletes, coaches, team personnel, cheerleaders, etc.) were tested, and 57 – or 1 percent – tested posi-

tive at some point in the pilot. Nearly 30,000 rapid antigen tests were administered – and 99.8 percent were negative. This showed that not only could contact sports be played, but more importantly could be played safely.

Non-contact Winter sports – girls and boys bowling, girls gymnastics, girls and boys alpine skiing and girls and boys swimming & diving – began full participation without delay in mid-January. On Feb. 4, the MHSAA received permission to set start dates for the rest of the Winter sports, with various MDHHS mask mandates in place for numerous sports, and yet additional rapid testing in place for wrestling. While there have been pauses and issues with teams over the past weeks, once again our schools have demonstrated that Winter sports can be played safely. This advocacy for activity will continue for our Spring sports to follow in the coming months.

Our goal from last July is now two-thirds complete. With today's Finals, these students that have endured so much since November have reached the finish line. In school sports, the lessons learned in competition often last a lifetime and for the Class of 2021, they have shown us all how to keep persevering, grinding and believing during some of the most difficult days in the past century.

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Scholar-Athlete Class of 2021

he Michigan High School Athletic Association/Farm Bureau Insurance Scholar-Athlete Award has been recognizing the top student-athletes for 32 years. Applicants for the Scholar-Athlete Award must meet the following criteria: A minimum cumulative grade-point average of 3.5 on a 4.0 scale; and must have previously won a varsity letter. Applicants also show involvement in other school and community activities; submit two letters of recommendation and a 500-word essay on the importance of sportsmanship in educational athletics.

Recipients of the 2020-21 Scholar-Athlete Award receive a \$1,000 college scholarship to be used at the college, university, or trade school of their choice during the 2021-22 school year. This year, a total of 1,356 applications from 418 schools were received for the 32 scholarships. Class A students were guaranteed 12 winners, Class B eight winners, Class C six winners and Class D four winners. Two at-large winners were also selected.

All scholarship recipients will be honored in a virtual ceremony later this spring. Details and a video of the ceremony will be posted on MHSAA.com.



Student Advisory Council Aids MHSAA

he Student Advisory Council is a 16-member group which provides feedback on issues impacting educational athletics from a student's perspective, and also is involved in the operation of Association championship events and other programming. Members of the Student Advisory Council serve for two years, beginning as juniors. Eight new members are selected annually to serve on the SAC, with nominations made by MHSAA member schools. The incoming juniors join the group of eight seniors-to-be appointed a year earlier.

Selected to begin serving on the Student Advisory Council in 2020-21 are: Brinlee Barry, Caledonia; Faith Breinager, Frankenmuth; Amina Ferris, Dearborn; Nico Johnson, Britton Deerfield; Brenna Kosal, Peck; Ashton McNabb, Three Oaks River Valley; Brock Porter, Orchard Lake St. Mary's; and Melik Williams, Ypsilanti Lincoln.

Those eight new members were selected from a record-high 179 applicants, twice as many as generally apply for SAC positions every year.

The first Student Advisory Council was formed for the 2006-07 school year. With the addition of this class beginning this summer, members will have represented 117 schools from 45 leagues plus independent schools that do not play in a league. Combined, the new appointees have participated in nine MHSAA sports, and seven will be the first SAC members from their respective schools.

The MHSAA Representative Council

he Representative Council of the Michigan High School Athletic Association is the body assembled to carry out the wishes of member schools. The Council meets several times annually to discuss and pass legislation concerning interscholastic athletics in Michigan.

The Representative Council is made up of 19 members, with all but five elected by a vote of MHSAA-member schools to represent different geographic regions, different sizes of schools, nonpublic schools, and junior and middle schools. Two members are elected to statewide at-large positions. Four members are appointed by the Council to facilitate representation of females and minorities, and the 19th position is occupied by the Superintendent of Public Instruction or his/her designee.

The officers and two other representatives form the MHSAA's Executive Committee, which meets on a monthly basis during the school year to review eligibility appeals and other current business.
